TREASURERS Pensions auto-enrolment final staging dates

The final group of Charges have their pensions auto-enrolment staging date on 1 August 2017. On this date a pension scheme needs to be in place, and all paid staff need to be assessed and receive the appropriate letter. Those earning £833 per month must be enrolled in a pension scheme (which may be the SEC scheme); those earning £490 are entitled to opt-in to a pension scheme with employer contributions; those below may join a scheme but no employer contributions are required. A declaration of compliance then needs to be completed for the Pensions Regulator.



MAJOR CHANGE TO HLF's GRANT SCHEMES

UPDATE 18 July 2017

BACKGROUND

1. As you will know from our previous emails, the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) is closing the Grants for Places of Worship (GPOW) scheme, after the final round of GPOW applications very soon. After the end of this year there will be no ring-fenced money from HLF for major repairs to churches and other places of worship.

This email deals with two quite distinct issues - one or both (or neither) may interest you.

- A. Obtaining a grant practical update (lengthy, but we hope useful)
- B. Responses to HLF's decision update (short)

A. OBTAINING A GRANT - PRACTICAL UPDATE

Background

2. As you probably know, grants will be awarded through two existing HLF schemes, which are open now to applications from places of worship. The schemes are called 'Our Heritage' and 'Heritage Grants'. In these two schemes, places of worship (which need not be listed) will be in competition with other types of applicant. Meeting

3. As we mentioned in our May update, in late June we organised a meeting between HLF and some of our members, to understand how the new arrangements will work in practice. We report here on four practical points.

How far down the road before applying

4. We asked how far down the road a place of worship needed to be before applying for a Our Heritage grant (up to £100k). One of our members had been told that if work to the fabric was involved, it was normal to be at RIBA Stage 3 when applying. Unfortunately at the meeting HLF were not willing to commit to this position, and were not able to give guidance on the matter. Our advice is that if you think you may wish to apply for a Our Heritage grant for work to the fabric, ask your local HLF team at what RIBA stage your

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entire plan of work and need for upfront funding and obtaining permissions. A list of the HLF teams is on our website www.hrballiance.org.uk/consultations-2/hlf-closure-of-gpow/

Proportionality of non-heritage outcomes

5. At our meeting, we were pleased that HLF stated unequivocally that **the non-heritage outcomes for a grant are expected to be proportional to the scale of the grant being sought**. (A non-heritage outcome might, for example, be 'people have learnt about heritage'.) Everything else being equal, smaller grants require less in the way of non-heritage outcomes. As this is nowhere stated in the 'Application Guidance' documents produced for the various HLF grant programmes, we were delighted to hear this.

Note: since our meeting, HLF have put up a link to a blog written about Cathedrals roughly a year ago, which makes this point helpfully and clearly about cathedrals. In providing the link, HLF explain that it applies also to smaller places of worship. Go to https://www.hlf.org.uk/looking-funding/what-we-fund/buildings-and-monuments/places-worship and scroll down until you find Questions, and click on 'Caring for Divine Heritage'. We think you should read this blog alongside the other relevant material on the HLF website and the Application Guidance for the scheme of your choice.

Comparison with other organisations

6. At our meeting, we were also pleased that HLF stated that **they took in to account the nature of the organisations involved when comparing one grant applicant with another**. For example, a place of worship offering a 'people have learnt about heritage' outcome would be judged less onerously than a museum offering the same type of outcome, because the museum exists for this very purpose. This is nowhere stated in the 'Application Guidance' documents produced for the various HLF grant programmes, so we were pleased to hear this.

Systematic decision making

- 7. At our meeting, we understood from HLF that there is no internal guidance as to how their members of staff should assess Our Heritage grant applications or the smaller Heritage Grant applications. We were told that the only guidance used by grant officers is the 'Application Guidance' documents for the various schemes. We were told that HLF relied entirely on the experience and training of their grants officers, and their networking with each other, to ensure equivalence of treatment of applicants, and to compare one application with another.
- 8. Places of worship will soon be applying for the first time in some quantity to the general grant schemes, rather than a dedicated scheme. Given the above, we are concerned, therefore, that places of worship will receive different treatment from different HLF offices to take just one example, what RIBA stage is required to apply for a Our Heritgage grant. In the future it may be sensible to put some systematic monitoring in place regarding this potential issue, but for the time being **we would like to hear of your experiences.**

B. RESPONSES TO HLF's DECISION - UPDATE

- 9. Two articles on the closure of GPOW have recently appeared. In addition, both Archbishop Stack of the Roman Catholic Church and the Church Buildings Council of the Church of England have made statements criticising the decision by HLF to close GPOW. The latter statement also suggests ways in which the changes made by HLF might be mitigated, and asks for comments.

Director for Theological Education

Anglican Communion Office

The Anglican Communion Office, based in London is the permanent Secretariat for the Instruments of Communion of the worldwide Anglican Communion. We are seeking to appoint a Director for TEAC (Theological Education across the Anglican Communion) based in London, to help build capacity for the delivery of good quality theological education for the whole people of God across the Anglican Communion. This is a five year project.

Major responsibilities include:

- to develop existing networks through facilitating regional consultations for theological educators;
- to develop existing networks through facilitating tri-annual conferences for Anglican leaders in theological institutions;
- to develop on line and web based networks for the sharing of information and learning resources and manage the existing relevant sections of the Anglican Communion Office website;
- to coordinate the dissemination and sharing of resources for catechesis and the nurture of the whole people of God in their discipleship in the world;
- to coordinate the development of The Anglican Way Signpost series;
- support the work across the Communion on hermeneutics and the development of the materials produced by the Bible in the Life of the Church initiative;
- to oversee the translation of resources into languages of the Anglican Communion beyond English;
- to develop a shared vision for theological education and to encourage a culture of teaching and learning.

It is desirable the successful candidate will:

- have had their work published;
- have an understanding of virtual learning and technology enhanced learning;
- have an awareness of the publishing/editing world in both the North and global South including digital and e-publishing.



The successful candidate will:

- have an understanding of the ecclesiology of the Anglican Communion;
- have extensive experience in theological education at all levels in the Anglican Communion and of working globally and cross-culturally at a senior level. Experience of working in Africa, South America or Asia is particularly desirable;
- have working experience of different approaches to adult education as well as current challenges facing the Church in the area of Christian education;
- have a graduate qualification in theology; an earned doctorate in theology is preferred:
- be able to engage with and have experience of working collaboratively with people from a range of backgrounds and nationalities;
- be able to work independently including the ability to start and successfully complete a major project;
- be confident in working with web-based materials and in the use of IT tools;
- have the ability to communicate ideas through both the written and spoken word and to build capacity in others.

The application should include a CV a covering letter and the names of at least three referees.

This senior position will be remunerated at £50k to £55k per annum plus benefits; reasonable relocation expenses may be paid.

The last day for applications is 10 August 2017; interviews are likely to take place on 16 August by conference call and second interviews on 29 September in London.




