We are in the process of asking any charges to update their **Consitutions**, if they are more than 10 years old, to bring them in line with OSCR regulations. Many vestries have



already been going through this process and we are hugely grateful for your time and effort on this. We will be in touch with others to encourage you to put this on your Vestry agenda for the Autumn. The GSO produced a model document in 2008 for both single and joint incumbencies and we have now added to this a working document which simply gives a box down the side in which to type any changes you wish to make to the model, thus clearer for you and for the Diocesan Registrar to look over. We also have a sheet which

There is a new craze that is bringing lots of new people to our churches. It is Pokémon Go: a game about catching or battling with cartoon creatures, played on the move with a mobile phone. Players view the real world through their phone's camera, and the game superimposes cartoon creatures on real streets and buildings for players to hunt in real time (they appear and disappear). Pokémon Go locates

its creatures at local landmarks, so many churches will find children of all ages (and adults!) turning up to play. This is a great opportunity for churches to engage with their local community, especially during the school holidays. CLERGY & TREASURERS

You may be aware that the Scottish Episcopal Church is a founding member of the new **Churches' Mutual Credit Union.**

CMCU has been set up as a joint initiative involving the Church of England, Church of Scotland, Church in Wales, the Methodist Church and ourselves. It is open to clergy, lay readers, church employees (including diocesan staff) and vestry members. General Synod has welcomed the establishment of the Credit Union and encourages support for its work. A flyer a giving more information is attached. Additional information regarding membership and loans (including car loans) is available from the CMCU website at http://cmcu.org.uk

Whilst, as yet, membership is restricted, it is the hope of CMCU, once it has built an established track record, to be open to all church members and expand its denominational base.

Part of the raison d'etre of CMCU is to use its skills and experience to support the credit union movement generally which can help people avoid being drawn into what can become devastating cycles of debt. In the words of the Ven Antony MacRow-Wood, who was instrumental in the establishment of CMCU: –

"Credit unions need to become, and be recognised as, a mainstream alternative to using a bank and to do that they need to serve a wide cross-section of society. Then they will be able to leverage what I call 'the credit union advantage' to achieve their social objectives. This advantage includes, the use of volunteers, payroll deduction (reducing both transaction costs and delinquency) and not having external shareholders. To reach out to that wider cross-section of society requires a changing of the public's perception about credit unions. There is a need to raise the 'brand image' so they are not just seen as a 'poor person's bank' but institutions that can offer an equivalent level of service and products as mainstream banks. CMCU aspires to do just that. Additionally by introducing clergy to the benefits of credit union membership they are better able explain those benefits to others, and Bishops are able to say to employers in their diocese 'we encourage our staff to join our credit union why don't you do likewise'."

Please pass this information on to your vestry and any lay readers or employees in your congregation. We understand that vestries are also able to open accounts with CMCU if they wish to.

Unlike some denominations the Scottish Episcopal Church does not operate a central payroll system and so we are not in a position provincially to offer payroll deduction in connection with regular saving with, or loan repayments to CMCU. However it should be possible for individuals who want to become members to save or schedule loan repayments or interest by way of direct debt, albeit interest rates may differ slightly from those applicable to members using payroll deduction. Fuller information will be available from CMCU direct.






#FromTheEdge - 2016 Just Festival Programme

With the summer approaching the Festival season is coming. The Scottish Episcopal Church will continue supporting the delivery of Just Festival at the Church of St John the Evangelist and Quaker Meeting House. The 2016 edition of the festival is dedicated to the theme of 'From the Edge' with the aim of focusing on people who are commonly perceived to sit at the edge of our communities and societies. A platform will be offered to a wide range of individuals, whether it's those who find themselves socially or politically marginalised, or perhaps the boundary-pushers who sit at the very edge of their disciplines, challenging the way we think about science, society, faith and the arts. The Just Festival Programme launched in mid-June includes performing arts events, conversations, talks, death cafes and exhibition. The programme highlights are:

- Acting Alone Acting Alone is inspired by the people Ava met in refugee camps in Palestine.
- Women's Stories, Women's Survival: Poems from the Edge Nadine Aisha will read from her debut poetry pamphlet 'Still' (Appletree Writers Press, 2016), exploring the power of women's voices and women's stories, linking them to women's survival.
- 'Til Death Do Us Part 'Til Death Do Us Part is a work in progress piece of theatre inspired by research into arranged marriages in Scotland.
- Every Picture Tells a Story Dr Dina Sidhva explains the research which underpins this exhibition, which tells the story of HIV-positive asylum seekers from Africa, living on the edge of despair and uncertainty.
- Roma Holocaust Talk and Redtal Talk on the Roma's culture and heritage, from slavery and holocaust to today, and their influence on European music. Followed by solo double bass folk/jazz recital by Cretu, who will perform his compositions inspired by Roma traditions.
- Being a Dad a drama reflecting the lived experience, hopes, fears and challenges faced by many fathers, especially disadvantaged young fathers in Scotland today.


 Al-Rowwad: Beautiful Resistance - Meet Dr Abdelfattah Abusrour, founder of the Beautiful Resistance and architect of Alrowwad Cultural Association in Alda Refugee Camp, Bethlehem. Using art, dance, music and film to break the cycle of violence and oppression experienced by young people living with the harsh realities of life under armed occupation.

- The Fair-Ground this new piece of Forum Theatre from Active Inquiry tells the story of a woman who has always believed that she lives in a fair society until events in her own life force her to see behind this façade.
- Hotel Europa Inspired by the events of the European crisis of the last few years, Hotel Europa brings together a European cast to tell the story of government imposed austerity and an unreformed banking sector across Furope
- Do you mind? HarmonyChoir (and special guests) will bring you an
 evening of inspirational and empowering music! HarmonyChoir is a group
 of singers, some of whom have experience with mental health symptoms.
- The Furnace The story of the three holy children from the Book of Daniel set for choir, soloists and string orchestra by Peter D Robinson.
- The Conversation Programme, to be hosted at Quaker Meeting House, will bring facts and stories surrounding Journeys of Asylum Seekers, Loneliness and Isolation, Contemporary Nomadic Life, Language and Identity and Penal Policy Implementation in Scotland, to name a few, closer to Just Festival audiences.

My Way: A Muslim Woman's Journey Friday 9th September 15.00 - 16.15

Debates about 'Islam' and 'the West' are now so common that it is easy to forget how damaging they can be. The vast majority of Muslims do not wish to see Islam used as a divisive force within the largely secular societies in which they live. How then can Muslim stereotyping be challenged? Siddiqui is one of the foremost Western authorities on the reconciliation of 21st-century life and Islamic custom. She looks at issues such as wearing the veil within society at large. She also asks: Who are we? How do we cope with growing older? What kind of world will we leave to our children? Placing her rich personal

journey in a wider context, the author is able to explore love and sex, multiculturalism and diversity, ageing and death. She shows why she is one of the most vital thinkers of our age.

Professor Mona Siddiqui is a regular commentator on Radio 4 and BBC Scotland's 'Thought for the Day'. She also chairs the Islam and Interreligious Studies Department at Edinburgh University.

Event Description: Matthew Fox is an internationally acclaimed theologian and spiritual maverick who has spent the last 40 years revolutionizing

Christian theology, taking on patriarchal religion, and advocating for a creation-centered spirituality of compassion and justice and re-sacralizing of the earth.

As a spiritual theologian, he has written over 30 books including Original Blessing, The Coming of the Cosmic Christ, A Spirituality Named Compassion, Christian Mystics and The Pope's War. His books have been translated into 49 languages and have been known for pioneering a unique approach to spirituality as a powerful force to transform religion, education, and culture.

Originally a Catholic priest, he was silenced for a year and then expelled from the Dominican Order to which he had belonged for 34 years by Cardinal Ratzinger for teaching liberation theology and creation spirituality. Matthew Fox currently serves as an Episcopal priest after he received what he calls "religious asylum" from the Episcopal Church. With exciting results he has worked with young people to create the Cosmic Mass (www.thecosmicmass.org) to revitalize worship by bringing elements of rave to the western liturgical tradition.

His work has been featured by The New York Times, Washington Post, Los Angeles Times, Chicago Tribune, San Francisco Chronicle, Rolling Stone Magazine, National Catholic Reporter, The Young Turks, Democracy Now! and he is a recipient of numerous awards including the Courage of Conscience Award by the Peace Abbey of Sherborn, Mass. Other recipients of this award include the Dalai Lama, Mother Theresa, Ernesto Cardinal, and Rosa Parks.
