For some time, we've been aware that there are a lot of creative folk in the congregation of St James the Less church in Penicuik. Our "Bright and Beautiful" exhibition will be a contribution to Penicuik's Arts Festival (PENFEST: <u>https://penicuikarts.org/ penfest-2016-2/</u>).

The exhibition will be displayed in our beautiful church (Broomhill Road, Penicuik, EH26 9EE). There is a free preview evening on Monday 5th September 2016, 7-9 pm, with live music (viols, organ, piano), wine and nibbles. Our final offering to the PENFEST fun takes place on Wednesday 7th September 7:30-9:30pm at The Art Centre, West Street, Penicuik, EH26 9DL. This will be a concert "Crossing Continents", presented by our very talented Alison Cole, supported by her equally talented family and friends. Alison is a gifted singer with a wide vocal range (I always think her voice is the vocal equivalent of a very favourite dessert!). 
FIRST ANNUAL SEI LECTURE




The Scottish Episcopal Institute is honoured and delighted that the Revd Professor Mike Higton, Professor in the Department of Theology and Religion, Durham University, will offer the first Annual SEI Lecture in New College on **Thursday 20th October 2016 at 4pm in the Martin Hall, New College.** The lecture will be on 'Teaching and Witness in the Life of the Church'. This will be followed by a reception in the Rainy Hall. The lecture is cosponsored by SEI and CTPI, New College.

Alongside research interests in the fields of Christian doctrine, Anglican theology and the theology of higher education, Professor Higton is currently responsible for academic input into Durham University's validation of the Common Awards in Theology, Ministry and Mission offered in conjunction with Ministry Division in colleges and courses around the country, and for developing collaborative research projects that bring together people from the church and university sectors to discuss the future of theological education. Professor Higton was part of the Validation Team which visited SEI last February to scrutinise its proposed entry into Common Awards.

Canon Gerald Osborne is appearing as St Mark in a dramatic retelling of St Mark's Gospel, reciting the entire Gospel to his scribe, Petronius. With more than 11,000 words and 16 chapters, learning the entirety of St Mark's Gospel by heart is an incredible feat. Gerald Osborne describes the Gospel as "a thrilling and powerful story of events and encounters through which we learn who Jesus is and why he came, as told through this near eyewitness account".

Gerald, who is Rural Dean of Pewsey and a Canon of Salisbury Cathedral, spent a number of years learning the Gospel. He said, "I was inspired by the discipline of learning St Mark in full after being challenged by a sermon at a service in 2011. I committed it to memory during moments when nothing else was happening, like time around the farm, waiting in queues and when travelling." He decided that it was such a powerful story that he wanted to dramatise it and share it with others.

The performance is in support of the international development charity Send a Cow, which works with some of Africa's poorest rural communities to give them the hope and the means to build sustainable futures for themselves.

Born in Duns 750 years ago this year, John Duns Scotus rose to become one of the leading philosophers of the Catholic Church in the Middle Ages. Educated at Oxford and in Paris, he was a leading figure in some of the great arguments in the Church, with his followers earning the name 'Dunces' from the followers of his rival St Thomas Aquinas - the origin of the Dunce's Cap. They were called this not because they were stupid, but because they stuck to the teachings of Duns Scotus.

A series of events is planned to mark this occasion designed to re-awaken interest in this son of Duns.

Revd Michael Fuller has served as a priest in the dioceses of Oxford and Edinburgh, and for 14 years he ran the training programmes for those entering authorised ministry in the Scottish Episcopal Church. He now teaches and researches at New College, primarily in the field of science and religion. He has been a regular opera-goer for over 30 years, and greatly enjoys sharing with others his passion for this art form.
