

BISHOP'S LENT APPEAL

FROM THE BISHOP

I have had a number of enquiries about the Lent Appeal. The short answer is that it will continue until Easter and I would ask you to send any money gathered to the Diocesan Office as usual*. The harsh reality, of course, is that present circumstances mean many people will not be able to give as generously as usual and that gathering and sending the contributions will be challenging.

Charities are suffering at the moment and the two charities we are supporting this year desperately need money to continue their work. In both cases, although in different ways, this work is vital for the post-pandemic world. So I would ask you to do all you can to encourage members to give as generously as possible. I propose that we set a payment deadline for the end of August by which time, let us hope, many of the present restrictions will have been relaxed.

That will mark the end of this year's appeal. I do not believe it is helpful simply to postpone it until 2021. Next year will bring new challenges.

CHURCH MAGAZINES AND NOTICES

- "Those that can be reached by email are welcoming our Newsletter that way and Dean and I have managed to drop in a paper copy to those that are not tech savvy." (Edinburgh, Good Shepherd)
- "I circulate our weekly pew sheet by email & encourage people to give copies to others." (Caroline Douglas-Home, Coldstream St Mary and All Souls)
- "The Vestry Secretary is converting the Christ Church website into one that can be useful to the three BECG churches. Helen Page has produced an excellent double-size Newsletter too." (Duns, Christ Church)

WORSHIP

- "The Berwickshire Group of Churches has used Zoom for people to join in Morning Prayer at 10am and Compline at 6pm. And last week's service from Christ Church, Duns was 'Zoomed' all thanks to Peter Estibeiro." "Our Rector is Zooming a service every Sunday morning at 10.45am. All those online have the joining ID." "By the Sunday 22 March the first BECG Zoom church service took place and by Sunday 29 March its virtual congregation had risen to thirty-two complete with music." (Berwickshire Charges Eyemouth, Coldstream, and Duns)
- "Nicki produced and arranged for every member of the congregation to receive a letter with a prayer card to use at noon each day and notes to give their neighbours offering practical/ spiritual help, also with a prayer on it. Our usual service sheet complete with words of hymns, intercessions and reflection is sent out using email or post each week. Morning Prayer is going to be said by Nicki at 9am daily using Zoom. The Rest & Return prayer group meet each Wednesday at 7.30pm using Zoom." (Colinton, St Cuthbert's)

- "A member of our congregation is a curator at the Modern Gallery and she has been conducting some online Gallery talks which many have found really interesting and something to take our minds off things for a brief while." (Edinburgh, Good Shepherd)
- "Dean himself has been taking pictures of the church and other local vistas to add to our website and other members have been posting pictures of the church garden as they have been passing to get shopping" (Edinburgh, Good Shepherd)
- "the CofS Minister uses Zoom for our ecumenical Lent Study Group on a Wednesday morning." (Eyemouth, St Ebba's)
- "There is a considerable amount of 'buddying' happening..." (Coldstream, St Mary and All Souls)
- "Telephone ministry a team has been set up and is calling every member of the congregation, checking up on their situation. If needed, calls are repeated weekly." (Colinton, St Cuthbert's)
- "Megan and her team delivered flowers to members of the congregation on Mothering Sunday." (Colinton, St Cuthbert's)
- "The Shalom Group is sending out resources and reflections for their usual monthly meetings." (Colinton, St Cuthbert's)
- "Plans are in place for virtual coffee mornings." "The organist Paul Starkey is developing online music and YouTube resources." (Duns, Christ Church)
- "All Vestry members had embraced Zoom and held their first Vestry virtual meeting on 23 March." (Duns, Christ Church)

STRATHALLAN AND PERTHSHIRE

Strathallan School is an independent boarding and day school for boys and girls in Scotland's scenic Perthshire. Its premises are available for hire during the holidays. The school has a 150-acre campus, which includes beautiful wooded grounds and a lake.

Sir Walter Scott is said to have described Perthshire as "the fairest portion" of Scotland. You are never far away from beautiful rivers, moors, mountains and lochs. Nearby visitor attractions include Scone Palace where Macbeth and Robert the Bruce were crowned and Loch Leven and its island where Mary Queen of Scots was imprisoned. Loch Leven's Larder has a great view of the Loch as well as a gift shop and restaurant, while just along the road in Bridge of Earn, there's the Roost Restaurant and coffee shop.

ACCOMMODATION

We will have sole occupancy of Thornbank Boarding House, as well as rooms in other buildings for group meetings and workshops. The dance on the last night will be held in the wood-panelled Music Hall. There is ample parking in the school grounds.

In the Boarding House there are toilet and shower facilities on each floor, and washbasins in all the bedrooms, some of which are on the ground floor. While bedding is provided, **please bring your**

TRANSPORT

Strathallan is situated about 7 miles south of the city of Perth. Directions for travelling by road can be found on the School's website: www.strathallan.co.uk There are regular buses and trains to Perth from Edinburgh, Glasgow and the North and a very limited bus service from Perth city centre to Forgandenny. There are taxis for hire at the bus or train station.

The cost which includes the Gathering Fee, Accommodation and Full Board is £470 for BPF members and those currently attending BPF seminars or courses, and £490 for non-members.

Foundation Grants for Maintenance

The Foundation Grant Programme is open. Applications will be considered on a rolling basis commencing at the end of January 2020. The final opportunity to submit an application will be 30 October 2020.

Also, small investigative works and surveys. Project costs should be up to £10,000 excl. VAT and awards will never exceed 50% of the costs. Decisions will be made on a rolling basis from the start of 2020.

Help us to secure our future

The Mission to Seafarers provides help and support to the 1.5 million crewmen and women who face danger every day to keep our global economy afloat and provide all of us with goods which we use in our everyday lives, often not understanding the journey they took to arrive.

The Mission to Seafarers Scotland works throughout Scotland, caring for seafarers of all ranks, nationalities and beliefs, through one full-time Chaplain and a band of ship-visiting

volunteers, providing them with practical, emotional and spiritual support.

We rely almost entirely on individual donations and periodic grants to carry out this support to our seafarers, but the reliance on this means it is very difficult to plan our work, from year to year. This is why we have launched the "R U 1 in a 1000?" campaign.

We are looking to build up 1,000 supporters, pledging just £10 per month. If we can achieve that, the future of our work will be both secure and sustainable for years to come. We know that many people have limited incomes but, next time you buy a banana from a supermarket, or a shirt from a clothes shop, pause and think of the crewmen and women who helped to bring them across the seas to our shores. Your £10 will bring them a supportive chaplain to talk to, who is not from their employer, it will help them call their loved ones back home, it will give them time off ship in our Seafarer's Centre or a taxi ride into the nearest town. Welcome relief when you have been in the middle of the ocean for weeks at a time.

To all Scottish church leaders.

We appreciate the interest many folk have taken in Street Pastors. To keep you up to speed this is an update and an invitation.



Update on developments

Areas: there are now over 650 Street Pastors operating in many towns and all cities except Dundee. The latest groups being set up this year are in Forres and Caithness with several other areas actively considering the possibility. Currently there are more requests from local authorities and police than we are able to fulfil.

Safe Spaces: some areas now work in partnership with other agencies to provide safe spaces, particularly at the office party season

Schools: some schools have school pastors operating, while other secondary schools have Street Pastors speaking to senior pupils about safety on the streets, tying in with schools' increasingly important health and wellbeing programme.

Rail: currently rail pastors operate in 4 lines

Major incidents: some 70 Street Pastors have had additional training to be available to be called out by emergency services as has happened at Grenfell Tower, Manchester arena, etc.

CEO: Chris Jewell has been appointed to succeed Sandy Scrimgeour who retires on 31 March.

We hear that some people think that Street Pastors drain resources from local congregations. Far from detracting from local congregations, Street Pastors work in partnership with them, providing training and experience which is of great value in the ongoing life and work of congregations. It is infectious operational in-service, teaching us to listen, help and care, and depend on God in prayer. The people we meet are the same shop assistants, tradesmen, professionals with whom Christians have contact 24x7! It helps praying folk realise that while mission is global it is also local!
