DIOCESAN OFFICE NEWS

NEWS FROM 21A

Although the time when we can re-open the office to staff is still a way off, we are working on a thorough Risk Assessment of how we would do it safely. Some close family members of 3 of our staff members work in hospital/hospice environments, so we need to be very careful. We do want to get back to 21A though, so that we have access to all the resources we need to serve you. In the meantime, we are working from our homes, but still available to help you with advice, support and resources as best we can.

The Buildings Committee, Finance & Management Committee and the Standing Committee have all met recently, successfully using Zoom Video Conferencing. A slightly surreal environment, when we have been used to face-to-face meetings, but it shows that good business can still be transacted. The Standing Committee signed off the audited 2019 Annual Diocesan Accounts, which will now be sent to OSCR. COVID-19 VESTRY QUESTIONS

Two recent queries were received and responses given, so I thought I should publish them here for you as well, in case you have the same things in mind:



Q: Can we let out our Church Hall yet, as the group we used to let it to are starting up again?

A: The reopening of such facilities would be part of Phase 3. The General Synod Office will be working on guidance for phases 3 and 4 in due course and that should include the question of hall lettings etc. On the basis that schools are supposed to be reopening in August, if churches have provided premises for e.g. nurseries, then provided the nursery itself is able to operate properly in terms of all necessary conditions and restrictions, then it would be possible for churches to allow resumption of those kinds of activities during phase 3.

Q: What records should we be keeping in our Church Register, as there are no Communion celebrations to record?

A: Keep a separate note, somewhere (Vestry Minutes?), of the approach you took, and the online services/worship that you setup. While churches are closed, no entries are required in the Register of Services, but you could include the following suggested wording, or compose your own:

"The coronavirus, otherwise known as COVID-19, was an infectious disease first identified in China. Infections were reported around the world with symptoms including fever, coughing and breathing difficulties. As a consequence, the Scottish Parliament advised many changes to everyday life for a time, which was endorsed by the College of Bishops. Church buildings were closed for public worship, private prayer and all other meetings and activities. The last service in this Church was on XXXXXXXXX and worship was able to resume [in a limited way] on YYYYYYYYY. In the intervening time we became the Church in different ways, specifically ... BISHOP'S LENT APPEAL

FROM THE BISHOP

I have had a number of enquiries about the Lent Appeal. The short answer is that I would ask you to send any money gathered to the Diocesan Office as usual*. The harsh reality, of course, is that present circumstances mean many people will not be able to give as generously as usual and that gathering and sending the contributions will be challenging. Charities are suffering at the moment and the two charities we are supporting this year desperately need money to continue their work. In both cases, although in different ways, this work is vital for the post-pandemic world. So I would ask you to do all you can to encourage members to give as generously as possible. I propose that we set a payment deadline for the end of August by which time, let us hope, many of the present restrictions will have been relaxed. That will mark the end of this year's appeal. I do not believe it is helpful simply to postpone it until 2021. Next year will bring new challenges.

Please help the diocesan office and forward your donation DIRECTLY TO YOUR CHURCH or treasurer and NOT to the Edinburgh Diocesan Synod account details below. This is because it hugely increases the accounting work at the office and, in addition, no Gift Aid can be claimed on donations from individuals.

MEET THE RECTOR

We are delighted to welcome Andrew Taylor-Cook to the Diocese to become Rector of Peebles and Innerleithen. Here Andrew tells us a little about himself and his background in England:



"I was born in Gateshead, but raised in a mining village in County Durham. Although my parents were very thoughtful and hard-working throughout their lives they were certainly not church goers, and so as a family, we never darkened the doors of a church, except for the usual hatch, match and dispatch of course. In fact I didn't start attending Church until I was 30 years of age. Which came as a bit of shock to me, and to my family!

I've had a varied career over the years, to include: Felt Roofer, Milkman, Storeman, Handyman, Civil Servant and voluntary worker. I have unfortunately spent a considerable amount of time unemployed too, and know what it is like to try and bring up a family on Social Security Benefits.

I first trained for ministry with the Church Army in Sheffield. As a Commissioned Church Army Evangelist I served as a half-time Parish Evangelist and half-time Chaplain amongst Deaf and Hard of Hearing People in the St Edmunsbury & Ipswich Diocese. It was during my time with St Eds and Ips that I trained for ordination with ERMC (Eastern Regional Ministry Course) at Cambridge.

I served my curacy with a team of 10 rural churches in the Diocese of Derby, before taking up a joint venture between the Diocese of Peterborough and the Diocese of Oxford, as a Chaplain amongst Deaf

and Hard of Hearing People (half-time in each). At the closure of this joint venture, I remained with the Diocese of Peterborough as a half time Chaplain, taking up a further half-time post as an Associate Priest with a group of 8 rural churches, before becoming the Acting Vicar of the Group, due to the incumbent's unfortunate resignation. I then served as Priest-in-Charge of a group of 5 rural churches back in the Diocese of Derby, before becoming their Vicar.

During this madcap journey in life, I met, and then subsequently married my lovely wife, Margaret, in 1981 when we were just 19-years of age! Since then, we have become the proud parents of 3 grown-up children (two boys and a girl) and now have the good fortune of being the proud grandparents to 6 wonderful grandchildren ... to date! Margaret and our 3 children were all born in County Durham, whereas our grandchildren are a mixture of South Yorkshire, Suffolk and Derbyshire.

Margaret and I are no strangers to Scotland having ventured over the border many times over the past 9-years, mainly on the west side to be honest, given that one of Margaret's sister's lives near Oban. Having said that, we have visited many places further in-land too, alongside visiting Edinburgh about 3-years ago.

Margaret and I are very much looking forward to meeting you all ...eventually! We are also looking forward to living, and working, within the beautiful Scottish Borders, and being a part of the Peebles and Innerleithen communities."

'TIME TO TALK'

COVID 19 Listening Service available for relatives and residents in care homes

A message from Claire Garabedian:

"I am writing to you on behalf of EIFA - Edinburgh Interfaith Organisation (a multifaith organisation which seeks to enable understanding and mutual respect within communities). The Scottish government has provided seed money to launch a service that will seek to be supportive to care home residents and their families during this time of Covid-19. As we all know, these unprecedented times have hit the care home sector especially hard, with families often unable to visit their loved ones living in care homes.

We will offer a seven day a week (I I am – 7pm) opportunity for care home residents and their family members to be listened to by volunteers via the telephone. The volunteers will be vetted for their experience and training as listeners. We hope that care home residents (who are able) and their family members will gain some solace and peace from this and that it will be a support for staff who are under pressure. Additionally, as this service is being offered through a multi-faith organisation, callers wishing to speak directly to someone of their faith will be connected through our service. It is important to note that although EIFA is a multi-faith-based organisation, all care home residents and their family members are welcomed to make use of this listening service — be they of a particular faith or none. Also, it is important to stress that this service will offer an understanding and empathic listening service; there will be no advice or counselling offered.

All calls will be held in the strictest confidence; only very basic background details will be noted as a record of who is making use of this service, to inform future and ongoing offering of this service.

As the manager of this listening service, I am asking if you would be willing to help to get the word out to any care home residents and their families about this service, so that they may perhaps find a measure of comfort during this most difficult time. I have attached a flyer that can be printed-off and posted/made available to residents and their families. I am happy to answer any questions or concerns you may have, as well as your suggestions as to additional ways we can let care home residents and families (at present only within Edinburgh and Glasgow) to make use of our service.

Many thanks for reading this letter. We hope that this service affords a measure of support for all involved. Please feel free to contact me at any time.
