#### **COVID-19: UPDATED GUIDANCE**

#### **REVISIONS TO PHASE 2 GUIDANCE**

In the light of the First Minister's announcement on 18 June 2020 regarding entry into Phase 2 of the Scottish Government's Route Map, some revisions have been made to the pastoral guidance from the College of Bishops and the guidance regarding the reopening of church buildings from the Advisory Group issued last week (12 June). Version 2 of each of the above guidance is now available as follows:

The alterations to the Bishops' Pastoral Guidance are to remove any reference to undertaking pastoral visiting in homes. When the Route Map was originally published, it was envisaged that Phase 2 would allow two households to meet together in homes but, in fact, the announcement from the First Minister yesterday indicated that any such meeting must for the time being remain outdoors.

The guidance from the Advisory Group regarding the reopening of church buildings has been revised to indicate that weddings in Phase 2 cannot be undertaken in church buildings and can only take place outside (subject to minimal attendees). Section G of the original version of our Phase 2 guidance indicated that members of up to two households could meet in church to undertake live streaming or recording of worship for broadcast. Contrary to our expectation in last night's direction, further investigation means that members of more than one household may meet in church to livestream worship or record worship for broadcast, provided 2m physical distancing is observed. There is no

change to our Phase 2 guidance on funerals in church which are permitted subject to restricted numbers as set out in our guidance.

No change is being made at this time to the Pro forma Phase 2 Plan for Vestries and so Version I remains current.

The Advisory Group guidance regarding the reopening of churches for individual prayer takes effect from 22 June 2020. Outdoor weddings are permitted under Government guidance only from 29 June 2020 and the Advisory Group's revised guidance regarding live-streaming/broadcasting from churches also takes effect from 29 June (when a variety of non-office workplaces are permitted to re-open). Similarly, the provisions in Section G regarding maintenance, repairs and organ practice should be regarded as taking effect from 29 June.



#### AROUND THE DIOCESE

#### **RESTRICTIONS BEGINNING TO EASE - PHASE 2 BEGINS**

Nicola Sturgeon has announced that Scotland will now begin to enter Phase 2 of the guidelines for easing lockdown – this is news that will bring relief to many people, as places of worship can and will begin to open up gradually, for private prayer. While this will not simply happen overnight, for churches across Scotland, including our diocese, this will cause many discussions regarding the best ways to start opening up our churches again. St Mary's Cathedral, for example, opened its doors for private prayer today (the 24<sup>th</sup> June), with MSP Ruth Davidson on hand to help out at a simple, socially-distanced ceremony. However, due to the risk still being too high to reintroduce services in church, Zoom and Facebook services will have to continue. Seeing how well we as a diocese have adapted to the current circumstances is heartwarming. There continue to be events online, with prayer groups meeting, coffee mornings taking place, services being broadcast live, and even activities like quizzes taking place to develop a sense of togetherness.




#### **CONTINUING ECO-CONGREGATION WORK**

#### **RECTOR AND VESTRY EXPRESS DELIGHT**

AS CHURCH RE-OPENS FOR PRIVATE PRAYER

Moving into Phase 2 of our battle with the COVID-19 pandemic sees the first opportunity since March for some of our churches to re-open to the public — although currently only for private prayer. Bob King, Rector of St Andrew's, Kelso, sent us a letter he's written to his congregation expressing the (cautious) relief that comes with seeing our church buildings once again used as houses of prayer.

"I am so excited to be able to tell you that at long last we can open the church for short periods for private prayer. The Bishop of Edinburgh has given his permission after a request from the Vestry that the church be re-opened. This has been made possible by the announcement on Thursday by the First Minister on behalf of the Scottish Government.



So, to cut to the chase. The church will be open during the following times.

Sunday Afternoons (from 28<sup>th</sup> June) 2.00 pm to 4.00 pm

Thursday Mornings (from 25<sup>th</sup> June) 10.00 am to Noon.

There will of course be restrictions and firstly we would like you to bring your own mask. Sadly, all hugging, kissing,

singing and handholding will need to be virtual as we maintain social distancing. We won't be able to have any public prayers as that would contravene the gathering restrictions and there will not be an opportunity for coffee, bacon rolls or any other refreshments.

There will be a one-way system entering through the main door and leaving via the back door (passing the loos which will be closed).

The GOOD NEWS is that you will be able to enjoy being back in the building, light a candle, pray, smile, reflect, dream and remember why this building is truly a place of inclusivity and prayer. Grace and I will be there to assist as you drop in for a short period of time with God.

That's it! The rest we will sort out as it arises but please be assured that our main concern is the safety and well-being of everyone and so we ask you to play your part in enabling us all to stay safe.

And here's a prayer written by Bob, that you might like to use as our churches tentatively re-open:

The latest advice from the SEC is available on the <u>Province website</u>. The recent advice (12 June) contains a lot of detail for you, but we've produced this 'FAQ' paper to help you with some of the main points:

**Q**: Once Phase 2 starts, who makes the decisions about re-opening?

A: A decision whether or not to restart any activities should be considered initially by the vestry, as the charity trustees for the charge. If the vestry wishes to proceed to restart any activities, it should first approach the Diocesan Bishop for consent. A pro forma has sent by the Province to all vestries.

Q: Do we have to reopen straight away?

A: Different congregations will move at different speeds as they emerge from lockdown and just because one congregation is in a position to undertake some resumption of activity in their church building does not mean that others should feel any pressure to do likewise.

**Q**: Can we leave the church open for Private Prayer?

A: Yes, but it is required that there should be a designated presence in the building at all times while it is open.

**Q**: How do we ensure social distancing for services etc.?

A: It may require cordoning off of pews or areas of seating to ensure the necessary distancing. Also, within a single pew, indication should be given as to where people may sit, so as to ensure appropriate distancing.

O: Can we use the church's toilets?

A: It is recommended that visitors should not have access to church toilets, unless procedures have been put in place locally to ensure that toilets can safely be operated in the current environment, in which case use of toilets should be for emergencies only.
