

COVID-19: NEW SEC ADVISORY GROUP GUIDANCE

The SEC Advisory Group published this update on Friday 3 September. This information was sent by email to all clergy, lay readers, vestry secretaries and diocesan secretaries.

The Scottish Government has updated its guidance for Places of Worship to reflect that Scotland is now "beyond level 0". This guidance can be accessed at: https://www.gov.scot/publications/coronavirus-covid-19-phase-3-guidance-for-the-safe-use-of-places-of-worship/

Below is a summary of the Advisory Group's recommendations as of Friday 3 September:

The Advisory Group will no longer produce its own lengthy guidance and instead directs congregations to the Scottish Government's own measures for places of worship. The first point of call for congregations is therefore the Scottish Government's own guidance.

The Advisory Group will, however, address some specific issues on the FAQs and Pastoral Guidance sections of the provincial website.

For congregations that wish to retain some of the practices recommended during previous lockdowns, the Advisory Group says that its <u>main guidance document</u>, which was last updated at the end of May 2021, can still be used for reference.

Whilst churches now find themselves with fewer restrictions, the Advisory Group is still urging them to **proceed with caution**.

The Group also reminds congregations that the relaxation of restrictions may be a source of anxiety for some. It recommends that "we must all be mindful of one another" and that "in so doing we 'love our neighbour'."

The Advisory Group also reminds churches of the important considerations outlined in its previous update from Friday 20 August:

Face coverings continue to be a legal requirement.

Face coverings do not, however, need to be worn by **those leading an act of worship** provided there is a partition between that person and other people, or a distance of at least 1 m is maintained between that person and others.

Neither do **those who are "performing"** need to wear face coverings provided there is a partition between each performer and others, or a distance of at least 1m is maintained between the performer and others. **Church choirs and worship bands** can, therefore, sing without face coverings, provided their members maintain at least 1m distance from each other and everyone else.

Congregants are not, however "performers" and must wear face coverings whether singing or not.

Churches should ensure cleanliness, good **ventilation**, the **disinfection** of "hand touch points" and engagement with **NHS Test and Protect**.

Churches should assess the level of risk in their own context as some may wish to continue with restrictions.

PILGRIMAGE TO COP26 (DUNBAR TO GLASGOW), SUNDAY 17 OCTOBER TO SUNDAY 31 OCTOBER 2021

A pilgrimage between Dunbar and Glasgow will provide the opportunity to reflect upon the climate crisis ahead of COP26 in November. Full details will be available at https://edinburgh.anglican.org/season-of-pilgrimage/ and https://artandecology.earth/pilgrimage-for-cop26.

The pilgrimage includes a public engagement programme to accompany the walkers and encourage participation *en route*.

Participating organisations include the Deep Time Walk Project, Interfaith Edinburgh, Interfaith Glasgow, Interfaith Scotland, John Muir's Birthplace, North Light Arts and Scottish Dance Theatre.

- 17th Oct Dunbar launch event from 2 pm
- 18th Oct Dunbar to North Berwick
- 19th Oct North Berwick to Aberlady Bay
- 20th Oct Aberlady Bay to Portobello and Edinburgh
- 21st Oct to 24th Oct Edinburgh Way Station (various events)
- 25th Oct Edinburgh to South Queensferry
- 26th Oct South Queensferry to Bo'ness
- 27th Oct Bo'ness to Falkirk (via Grangemouth)
- 28th Oct Falkirk to Kirkintilloch
- 29th Oct Kirkintilloch to Glasgow
- 30th Oct to 31st Oct Glasgow Welcome (various events)

Plans for two of the pilgrimage days have already been released:

Dunbar – Sunday 17 October & Monday 18 October Afternoon of Sunday 17 October

- Eco-themed activities are to take place in Dunbar across the John Muir Birthplace, the Dunbar Battery and Lauderdale Park (outdoor venues) in collaboration with groups including Northern Light Arts and Sustaining Dunbar.
- Pilgrims will be welcomed as they gather in preparation for the Art and Ecology Pilgrimage, walking for which begins in Dunbar on Monday October 18. Walkers from the Youth Christian Climate Network (YCCN) relay will also be arriving *en route* from Cornwall, the location of the G7 Summit, before heading to Glasgow.
- Alasdair MacIntosh has been invited to speak at Belhaven Parish Church Hall in the evening.
- St Anne's Church will be a Spirituality Hub with climate-focused prayer stations created by local Christians. The World Community for Christian Meditation will offer guided silent meditation sessions and, outside the church, a public reading of key findings from the recent IPCC report is being planned in order to draw attention to the scientific reality of global warming.

Monday 18 October

- Walkers are invited to gather in Dunbar at 9 am on Monday 18 October to walk the John Muir Way to North Berwick with others. If you are interested in joining the walk or participating in the event above, please contact Rev Diana Hall at rector.stannesdunbar@gmail.com.

Bo'ness to Falkirk - Wednesday, 26 October

- After spending the night at St Catharine's Church, pilgrims plan to gather at Bo'ness Foreshore before walking to the Kinneil Lagoons (an accidental, human-made habitat which is home to thousands of wintering birds).
- Pilgrims will then pray their way along the public road passing through Scotland's refinery at Grangemouth.
- Refreshments will be served at St Mary's Episcopal Church, Grangemouth, before continuing to the Kelpies. An interfaith gathering will take place at the Peace Pole in Helix Park. Christ Church, Falkirk, will offer a quiet place for evening reflection. Accommodation in Falkirk is being settled (could you offer a pilgrim a bed for the night?). PILGRIMAGE CONFERENCE, WEEK ENDING SATURDAY 26 FEBRUARY 2022

Zoom-based talks are planned for several evenings, ending in a day conference on Saturday 26 February. Talks will cover a range of historical, scriptural and spiritual themes. Details to be released.

CAMINO DE SANTIAGO WALK, MAY 2022

This walk of the 73-mile (117km) Pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela is being organised by Rev Nick Bowry, who is familiar with the route.

It is proposed that a group would depart on or around Monday 16 May, depending on flights from London Stansted to Santiago. There will be a 90-minute coach journey from Santiago to Ferrol completed on the day we arrive at Santiago airport.

The group would walk the route from Ferrol to Santiago over six days, with one night in Santiago at the end. The minimum duration would be eight days, but people could stay for longer if they wish not to be rushed when obtaining a certificate, which can involve long queues.


Accommodation would be in mixed hostel dormitories (c.€15 per night) as well as in low-cost hotels

(c.€25-35 per night) en route. In Santiago, hotels are expensive (minimum €50 per night). Participants should allow €20 per day for food and drink, and they would have to walk with a rucksack. A forwarding service may be available (approx. €5 per day).

THE BIG WALK, 28 MAY 2022

Save the date! Groups will walk from South Queensferry, Balerno, Roslin and Musselburgh to St Mary's Cathedral, carrying pre-made banners and picking up other pilgrims on the way. There will be prayers and celebrations at the Cathedral. The event is particularly appropriate for Pentecost;



when the Spirit came at the birth of the Church, Christ's followers "were all together in one place."

LONGER WALKS

St Cuthbert's Way: Melrose to Lindisfarne, Holy Island, March 2022 (6 nights/7 days, 61.5 miles/99.5km)

- This walk will be organised by Shepherds Walks Holidays. It is a supported walk, involving accommodation in B&Bs and local inns, and luggage being transported daily.
- Cost: £619.00 without packed lunches or £689.00 with packed lunches. A single supplement costs £240.00. The minimum booking is six people.

LOCAL PILGRIMAGE EVENTS

Every church is encouraged to develop its own form of pilgrimage, whether by walking, driving, cycling or travelling on public transport.

For example, St Mary's, Grangemouth, and St Catharine's, Bo'ness, will spend a day this autumn visiting sites associated with their history. Congregants from St Mary's will visit the ruins of Dunmore Church; drop in to Christ Church, Falkirk; take a trip to the Rectory (built on the site of the first tin kirk); and finish at the church itself.

Additionally, congregants from Bo'ness will visit medieval ruins at Carriden and Kinneil; a church graveyard which has, at different times, been converted into a cinema, garage and house; travel to the Town Hall; and end at St Catharine's, which was built 100 years ago.

GOVERNMENT FUNDING FOR GREENER CHURCHES

As the SEC aims for net zero carbon emissions by 2030, churches may be interested to know that they could secure Scottish Government funding for renewable and low-carbon building solutions.

The Scottish Government's Community and Renewable Energy Scheme (CARES) can provide churches with up to 100 per cent of funding in grants and loans for technologies including solar panels and heat pumps. Applications will be considered on a first-come-first-served basis, meaning that interested churches should act straight away. COULD YOU HELP PROTECT MISSING PEOPLE AND THEIR FAMILIES?


For 25 years, the UK charity Missing People has provided frontline emotional and practical support to people who have left home or who are contemplating leaving home, as well as anyone who has a missing loved one.

Crucial to the activities of Missing People is its Safeguarding Briefing Network (SBN). The SBN consists of organisations with a safeguarding or community protection role, to which Missing People can send missing-person briefings in the hope that the individual in question will encounter that organisation's services. This is subtler than a public appeal showing the name and photo of a missing person.



SABBATICAL BURSARIES AVAILABLE

Stipendiary clergy can apply for Ecclesiastical's Ministry Bursary Awards until 30 September.

Awards are given to help finance sabbaticals and periods of extended study.

Applicants must have been ordained for at least 10 years and must not have taken sabbatical leave at any point over the last seven years. The scheme is open to bishops, deans and assistants.

CALL FOR PARTICIPANTS: STUDY ON BEREAVEMENT AND COVID-19

NatCen is looking for churches to help source participants for a new study examining the impact of COVID-19 upon bereavement and grief.

The research organisation hopes its findings will broaden the mental health support available to bereaved individuals, improve funeral practices and reflect upon public-health messaging.

Recommendations will be presented to key stakeholders including government departments, bereavement organisations and funeral directors.

Participants would be invited to take part in two telephone or video interviews on their experiences. They would remain anonymous and any information given would be kept confidential. Participants would receive £15 for taking part in each interview.

RING YOUR CHURCH BELLS FOR COP26

Churches are being called to ring their bells on the eve of the COP26 summit to raise awareness of the climate emergency.

Your congregation can join churches across Britain by sounding its bells between 6 pm and 6.30 pm on Saturday 30 October.

Whilst church bells have for centuries been used to warn communities of danger, they could also serve as a means of welcoming international delegates to the conference in Glasgow.

Churches interested in participating in the event, which has been publicised by climate practitioner <u>Edward Gildea</u>, are encouraged to contact the <u>Central Council of Church Bell Ringers</u> (CCCBR) to formally express interest and let them know about their plans.

Congregations are also encouraged to contact local press and spread news of the event on social media.

Wouldn't it be great if every church and cathedral bell in Britain were to ring out a warning on the eve of COP 26?

What is COP 26 and why does it matter?

COP is the 'Conference of the Parties' and the 2021 meeting in Glasgow this November will be the 26th meeting. They started following UN conference in Rio de Janiero in 1992, but despite all the conferences since then, our global emissions have continued to rise. From 5 billion tonnes in 1950, 18 billion in 1980, 23 billion in 2000 and 33 billion in 2020. We are speeding in the wrong direction!

At the Paris Agreement in 2015, countries agreed to try to keep global warming down to 2° or lower. Currently we are way off track to meet that target and the IPCC report this August was most forceful in outlining the irreversible effects that we will suffer and many are already suffering.

COP 26 in Glasgow really is the 'make or break' conference that will determine humanity's survival. So let's ring out our warning!

The first Anna Chaplain, former broadcaster and Licensed Lay Minister Debbie Thrower, works for The Bible Reading Fellowship (BRF) as the founder and pioneer of this work, while remaining a part-time Anna Chaplain in Alton. BRF is responsible for the promotion and development of Anna Chaplaincy, which sits squarely within all that the charity does to inspire, equip and enable people in their churches and communities.
