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

A flowchart guiding you through the Canon 35 process for alterations to church buildings is available, along with the all-important quinquennial inspection report pro forma – a crucial element of your church's five-year maintenance audit.

On the website churches can also find safeguarding training packs, a model constitution for vestries and information on how to make amendments to such documents, as well as a handy form to notify the diocese of any new appointments to your vestry.

FIRE ALARMS IN RECTORIES

The Scottish Government has passed legislation which means that, from February 2022 "all homeowners will be <u>required</u> to have interlinked alarms under legislation brought forward after the Grenfell Tower tragedy in 2017. These alarms significantly reduce casualties by alerting everybody in a property to a fire. Most homes will also require a carbon monoxide alarm. Private rented and new-build homes must already meet these standards, but from February they will apply to every home in Scotland."

MAINTAINING LINKS BETWEEN THE EDINBURGH AND DUNEDIN (NEW ZEALAND) DIOCESAN OFFICES

For several years now, Edinburgh Diocese staff have enjoyed strong links with their counterparts at the office of the Diocese of Dunedin in New Zealand.



Readers may recall that The Bishop of Edinburgh, The Rt Revd Dr John Armes, and his wife, Clare, travelled to Dunedin in 2019.

The Diocesan Administrator, Simon Filsell, very recently had a Zoom call with his opposite number, Andrew

Metcalfe, the Dunedin Diocesan Registrar, who is based at Peter Mann House.

Simon and Andrew discussed the pastoral and financial impacts of the pandemic upon their respective Dioceses, as well as the most recent Edinburgh Diocesan Synod and the ordinations of recent weeks.

We would like to thank the Diocese of Dunedin for sharing the last edition of *The Communicant* - a special edition for COP26 - and the most recent newsletter from the Youth and Children Officer, Claire Benton-Evans.

Dunedin held the first day of their Diocesan Synod on Saturday, 6 November. A second is to take place in December or in early 2022.

COVID-19: NEW SEC ADVISORY GROUP GUIDANCE

The SEC Advisory Group published this update on Friday 3 September. This information was sent by email to all clergy, lay readers, vestry secretaries and diocesan secretaries.

The Scottish Government has updated its guidance for Places of Worship to reflect that Scotland is now "beyond level 0". This guidance can be accessed at: https://www.gov.scot/publications/coronavirus-covid-19-phase-3-guidance-for-the-safe-use-of-places-of-worship/

Below is a summary of the Advisory Group's recommendations as of Friday 3 September:

The Advisory Group will no longer produce its own lengthy guidance and instead directs congregations to the Scottish Government's own measures for places of worship. The first point of call for congregations is therefore the Scottish Government's own guidance.

The Advisory Group will, however, address some specific issues on the FAQs and Pastoral Guidance sections of the provincial website.

For congregations that wish to retain some of the practices recommended during previous lockdowns, the Advisory Group says that its <u>main guidance document</u>, which was last updated at the end of May 2021, can still be used for reference.

Whilst churches now find themselves with fewer restrictions, the Advisory Group is still urging them to **proceed with caution**.

The Group also reminds congregations that the relaxation of restrictions may be a source of anxiety for some. It recommends that "we must all be mindful of one another" and that "in so doing we 'love our neighbour'."

The Advisory Group also reminds churches of the important considerations outlined in its previous update from Friday 20 August:

Face coverings continue to be a legal requirement.

Face coverings do not, however, need to be worn by **those leading an act of worship** provided there is a partition between that person and other people, or a distance of at least 1 m is maintained between that person and others.

Neither do **those who are "performing"** need to wear face coverings provided there is a partition between each performer and others, or a distance of at least Im is maintained between the performer and others. **Church choirs and worship bands** can, therefore, sing without face coverings, provided their members maintain at least Im distance from each other and everyone else.

Congregants are not, however "performers" and must wear face coverings whether singing or not.

Churches should ensure cleanliness, good **ventilation**, the **disinfection** of "hand touch points" and engagement with **NHS Test and Protect**.

Churches should assess the level of risk in their own context as some may wish to continue with restrictions.

COP26 JOIN THE GLOBAL DAY OF CLIMATE ACTION, SAT 6 NOV

Congregations are encouraged to join an historic day of climate-focused global action and mass mobilisation in Glasgow on Saturday, 6 November.

Churches from across the Diocese of Edinburgh have the opportunity to make their voices heard on the day, alongside members of other Scottish faith and belief communities, as part of the Faiths and Beliefs Bloc @ COP26. This interfaith Bloc is being led by The Rev Dr Martin Johnstone, COP26 Ambassador for Glasgow Churches Together.



The Bloc will gather in Kelvingrove Park from 11.30am at one of the largest-scale protests being organised by the COP26 Coalition. Similar demonstrations will be taking place across the UK and as far away as Montréal, New York City, Lisbon, Stockholm and San Francisco.

From Kelvingrove, protesters will march through the streets before arriving at Glasgow Green at 3pm.

Protesters can come alone or as part of a group. The Faiths and Beliefs Bloc gathering is suitable for families.

Demonstrators are very welcome to dress colourfully, whilst bearing in mind the weather prospects for a November day in Glasgow.

Everyone is invited to join an impromptu COP26 Faiths and Beliefs Bloc band. Percussion instruments can be made from milk cartons and ice-cream tubs. Professional-level drums and melodic instruments are also appropriate.

Participants should take a lateral-flow COVID-19 test before arriving and should wear a mask at all times.

INSTITUTION OF THE REV AARON MOFFAT-JACKMAN





COP 26 HOW CAN OUR DIOCESE TAKE PART?

Here are some ways in which your church could take part in COP26:

- Join the Faiths and Beliefs Bloc @ COP26 at the COP26 Coalition demonstration in Kelvingrove Park on Saturday, 6 November (see above).
- Pray for/preach on: the integrity of Creation; the wonders of our planet; those affected by climate injustices; the importance of preventing global warming; the leaders involved in making momentous decisions; and those working on behalf of our Church in relation to COP26.
- Organise a socially distanced event outside your church where people come together to pray for justice for the poorest and for our planet. You could hold a vigil outside your own church on Saturday, 6 November, and you could involve other churches, faith groups and community organisations.
- Make a banner to hang outside your church to tell everyone about the climate emergency.
- **Speak up for the poorest and most marginalised.** You could show these four short videos created by Christian Aid, SCIAF, Tearfund, the Church of Scotland and the Glasgow Churches Together COP26 Group to your congregation and community. The links are here: Ethiopia, Honduras, Malawi and Zambia.





Applications for next year's Alastair Haggart Bursary have opened.

The annual Bursary is dedicated to the memory of Bishop Haggart, who was the Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church between 1977 and 1985.

The successful applicant will receive up to £1,300 to finance a sabbatical or another similar leave of absence that will significantly enhance their development. The outcomes of their funded project should also be of benefit to the wider Church. Lay readers and clergy ministering in the Scottish Episcopal Church may apply.

HISTORIC DECLARATION TO BE SIGNED AT ST MARY'S CATHEDRAL

Myriad treaties and declarations have had a profound impact upon Scottish history.

Next month a brand-new one will enter Scotland's history books during a special service at St Mary's Cathedral on St Andrew's Day.

The Saint Andrew Declaration, which will be signed on Tuesday, 30 November by the Most Rev Mark Strange, Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, and the Rt Hon



Jim Wallace PC QC (Baron Wallace of Tankerness – Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland), will see both churches formally recognise one another as part of the one Church of Jesus Christ.

Through a series of acknowledgements and commitments, the Declaration will lay the foundations for closer cooperation between the Scottish Episcopal Church and the Church of Scotland.

The Declaration is an initiative of the Our Common Calling Working Group, which brings together members of the Church of Scotland's Committee on Ecumenical Relations and the Scottish Episcopal Church's Interchurch Relations Committee.

Church leaders, clergy, congregants and anyone else with an interest in the ecumenical work undertaken between churches in Scotland is invited to celebrate the adoption of the Declaration in an online day conference on Tuesday, 30 November. **Conference registration is here.**

Anyone is welcome to attend the official signing of the Declaration at St Mary's Cathedral, Palmerston Place, at 4.30 pm on Tuesday, 30 November. The service will also be live-streamed.

COP26 SIGN THE GLASGOW MULTI-FAITH DECLARATION



Scotland's faith communities are coming together to sign an historic declaration marking their collective commitment to a more sustainable world.

Congregants from the Diocese of Edinburgh are encouraged to add their names to the Glasgow Multi-Faith Declaration for COP26, a petition which has been crafted by representatives from the Scottish Religious Leaders' Forum, and which is being circulated by Interfaith Scotland.

The petition, which has already been signed by the Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, The Most Rev Mark Strange, asks world leaders and politicians at next

month's conference to "commit to the agreements made at the Paris Summit in 2015" and to promise to "[work] together to ensure the continuation of life of earth".

It also requests that the most influential across the globe "commit to climate justice for all" and that they "listen to the voices of ordinary people everywhere who are crying out for real, visionary and immediate climate action".

STORM SAFETY ADVICE FOR CHURCHES

As daylight-saving measures come into force and the weather gets chillier, churches may be interested in this guidance on storm safety from <u>Ecclesiastical</u>.

The insurance company recommends:

- Trimming back any bushes or trees that could cause damage;
- Ensuring year-round maintenance of your church building;
- Securing loose objects in the churchyard and grounds;
- Closing large doors and windows securely;
- Watching out for any fallen cables in the event of a storm;
- Contacting reputable contractors.

PROTECT YOUR CHURCH AGAINST CYBERATTACKS

We have received the following from the Charity Commission:

"The Charity Commission has <u>warned</u> charity leaders to protect their organisations against fraud and cybercrime, after new figures show charities reported almost £8.6 million of lost funds in the last financial year.

This latest data from Action Fraud also shows 1,059 separate incidents of fraud were reported by charities from April 2020 to March 2021. The true scale of fraud against charities is believed to be much higher, as fraud is known to be underreported.

The Commission is highlighting these figures, and the risk to charities from fraud, as part of <u>Charity Fraud</u> <u>Awareness Week</u>, an annual campaign that aims to highlight ways charities can protect themselves from fraud."



Following his previous best-seller, Enfolded in Christ: The Inner Life of a Priest, and The Mystery of Faith: Exploring Christian Belief (a video introduction is available here), this new book explores the wisdom offered to the world by the Religious Life as it has been lived, in particular, by Anglicans.

It is concerned to show the way in which this life has a treasury of basic knowledge concerning human life and how we can live together. The Life has been present, in some form, in the Church from the beginning of Christianity and in the Anglican Communion for almost 200 years but is frequently overlooked or considered irrelevant yet has helped mould both individual well-being in Christ and the shape and wisdom of the Christian world.

Whilst it uses stories concerning various communities it is not primarily intended to promote the Life, although it was written with a view to help those who may be considering their call. Chapters include: Seeking God and the wisdom of the Desert tradition; The Monastic Way and Contemplative Living; For the Sake of the Kingdom, offering insights into the way the Life responded to growing social needs; Habits and Hearts, looking at the way we express what lies most deeply within us; Priests and Prophets, reflecting on how the Life might inform both the ordained and those seeking to live prophetically, and The Hidden Monk, exploring the way the 'monk' (nun) lies in the depths of us all.

CODE RED – a print installation by one of Britain's foremost political artists Peter Kennard.

We're living in a time of absolute emergency. We're tottering through the rubble of the rampant free market. It's a time in which images can open up a critical space that can jolt assumptions and break through denial. The poet Shelley wrote that 'we must imagine what we know'. By picturing the result of extracting wealth out of the ground by every means possible I'm trying to picture what we know will happen if we don't stop this plunder. — Peter Kennard

In August this year the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) released their report. Their findings, prepared by 234 scientists from 66 countries, warn that human activity has warmed the climate to a point that is unparalleled by anything in the last 2,000 years and that by 2019 atmospheric CO2 concentrations were higher than at anytime in at least two million years. The UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres said the IPCC report was the 'code red for humanity, the alarm bells are deafening and the evidence is irrefutable'.

Through the use of photomontage the artist turns his outrage into images. Throughout CODE RED Kennard re-appropriates the beautiful photo of the whole earth taken by the Apollo astronauts in 1972, which Kennard cuts and tears, combining it with images of industrial chimneys, oil refineries exploding, polluted dust, gas masks, parched earth and floods. His image of the earth surrounded by a clock symbolises climate/nuclear destruction, whilst in another image planet earth is transformed into a seed sprouting a tree. Kennard's work makes visible the increasing devastation of the natural world, revealing this breakdown not as inevitable but the direct result of human activity. The resulting montages can then be used as a visual arm of the struggle for climate justice.

CODE RED is presented by Peace & Justice (Scotland) in partnership with Street Level Photoworks to coincide with COP26 – UN Climate Change Conference in Glasgow. Supported by National Lottery Community Fund, Jackarts and Stop Climate Chaos Scotland.
