DIOCESAN SYNOD

The agenda business for Saturday 25 February is now published, and you can download it from:

Synod will be in-person at St Paul's & St George's in Edinburgh (Synod Eucharist at 8.30am), and could we please remind you that both clergy and lay members who are unable to attend the meeting **must** submit apologies, so that our attendance records are up to date. Thank you.

OFFICE IT PROBLEMS

A few weeks ago, the Diocesan Office IT server suffered an error which required reverting us to a backup. Unfortunately, it was then discovered that an unconnected error in the backup software meant that the last secure data we had was on I Ith December 2022. Whilst we cannot now do anything about that, Simon Filsell met with the Operations Director and Major Incident Manager from the IT support company to discover what went wrong and how to prevent it in the future.

Please note therefore that there may be files and data we have 'lost' in the period between then and now. We are really sorry about this, and we are doing our best to reconstruct much of our work using emails received/sent during that period. This may of course, affect the **Annual Returns**. and the log, later in this edition. Please do let us know if we have missed any forms not recorded in the log. All the returns done using **Google** forms are completely safe though, thankfully.

SAFEGUARDING – Appointments

We have had a number of queries in recent months about the appointment of PVG Coordinators. In the document "Appointing a PVG Co-Ordinator for your Congregation" (can be found on the SEC website) it says: "When the Vestry has identified a suitable candidate, the Vestry Secretary should seek references (which should be sent to the Bishop) and ask the Bishop to approve the appointment."

The document also includes the Role Purpose and the Duties of the coordinator. Also, for information, Donald Urquhart, the Provincial Protection Officer has now retired, and Daphne Audsley is now handling all safeguarding matters until Donald's replacement starts. Recruitment is also underway for a dedicated Training Officer for safeguarding, so we hope to see several new training opportunities very soon. As soon as we get any news of that, we will let you know in *The Communicant*.

NATIONAL CHURCHES TRUST: MAINTENANCE GRANT

The Foundation Grant Programme offers our small grants of between £500 and £5,000 towards urgent maintenance works and small repairs identified as high priority within a recent Quinquennial Inspection or Survey Report. Also, small investigative works and surveys. Project costs should be up to £10,000 excl. VAT and awards will never exceed 50% of the costs. Decisions are made on a rolling basis.

Non-Domestic Alternative Fuel Payment - users for testing support

The Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) hopes to be put in contact with users that will be able to test the proposed energy support package.

BEIS are looking for:

- 1. Contacts with the authority to apply for support on behalf of their organisation/building with access to information such as invoices, building records and heating bills
- 2. Representing organisations operating in buildings that are **non-domestic**, **off the gas grid**, and using **large quantities kerosene for heating** (for instance above 10,000 litres per year)
- 3. Contacts would need to be able to participate in remote usability testing sessions of around 60 minutes, with internet access and Microsoft Teams enabled. We can offer a payment of £50 per interview

If your organisation meets any of the above criteria and would like to help test the proposed support package for non-domestic alternative fuel payment, please contact Jonathan Sweetman (<u>lonathan.Sweetman@beis.gov.uk</u>) and Christina Ehlers (<u>Christina.Ehlers@sparck.io</u>).

Vacancy for the position of Convener of the Ethical Investment Advisory Group at the General Synod Office.

A convener for the reconstituted Ethical Investment Advisory Group (EIAG) is being sought, and any lay or ordained members of the SEC who are interested in the position are being encouraged to get in touch. Bishop of Edinburgh Lent Appeal 2023


In the Scottish Episcopal Church we believe it is a priority to provide high-quality training to form the next generation of church leaders. We recognize how important it is to resource our Scottish Episcopal Institute and we are proud of its success. At the Lambeth Conference last year, I discovered that this is a priority shared right across the Anglican Communion, but many Provinces struggle to find a consistent funding stream for their Seminaries and Theological Colleges.

My appeal this Lent is in support of St Nicholas' Seminary in Cape Coast, Ghana. Cape Coast is our partner diocese and I had the great joy of visiting the Seminary when I attended Bishop Victor's enthronement 10 years ago. The Dean of the Seminary, Joseph Bain-Doodu, was in the UK last year so I learned first-hand of his struggle to provide excellent training with limited and erratic funding sources.

This water filtration project seems to me to be a wonderful example of self-help. I commend it to you and ask for your generous support. I know that the cost-of-living crisis is hitting many of us hard just now, but I hope, nevertheless, that by pooling our generosity we may help to sustain the life of a church, far away in geographical terms, but close to us within the life of Christ.

As Joseph explains, a comparatively small amount of money (for us) can make a big difference for the ongoing life of the church in West Africa.

Water Filtration Project St Nicholas' Seminary, Cape Coast, Ghana

St Nicholas Seminary has been training clergy since 1975. It is the only active seminary in the Province of West Africa

(which includes Ghana, Liberia, Sierra Leone, Guinea, the Gambia, and Cameroon). Alongside our own ordinands, we have also trained ministers and lay pastors for the Methodist and Pentecostal Churches in Ghana and Ivory Coast.

Over the years, we have trained over 500 priests and currently there are 40 students in training. We have four full-time lecturers, eight adjunct lecturers and ten non-teaching staff. We are affiliated to the University of Cape Coast and run programmes in Bachelor of Theology, Diploma in Theology, Diploma in Ministry, Certificate in Ministry and Certificate in Anglican Studies.

Bishop of Edinburgh Lent Appeal 2023

The Problem

Each diocese is expected to pay for its own ordinands, but some cannot afford to do so. With the ever-increasing cost of goods and services, alongside ongoing economic challenges, our budget is constantly in deficit. Sometimes, indeed, we are unable to feed our students or to pay our utility bills and must send our students home abruptly. This lack of financial sustainability makes it hard to attract and retain staff, and almost impossible to renovate and maintain our buildings.



An Idea

With all this in mind, we have come up with an innovative idea that will generate regular income and so offer us financial stability. There is a need for

clean water in Cape Coast, so we plan to establish a water filtration plant. This purified water will be sold to schools, university students and the general public.

The machinery will cost 187,250 Ghana Cedis – approximately £12,200.

We know this is a lot of money, but we hope you will feel able to support us this Lent. Once in full production we would expect our plant to bring in over £9000 a year. You will be helping us to help ourselves, as we seek to provide consistent care for staff and students and to prepare labourers to reap God's harvest for many years to come.

Leadership in a time of change

A short course for ministers and lay leaders to equip them to offer the kind of leadership the church requires at the moment.

The church is commissioned by Christ to play its part in God's mission to the world. Many parts of the church in Scotland are both rediscovering the central place of mission and struggling to work out what this means in practice. They are looking for leadership.

There is an urgent need for both ministers and lay leaders to offer appropriate leadership so the church can play its part in Christ's mission. This short course is designed first, to help you offer the leadership the church requires, and second, to help you develop the leadership potential others in the church have.

Living Well with Differences Course

Our churches face change, encounter differences and can struggle to manage conflict. This can often impact the health and wellbeing of many in our churches. The Scottish Episcopal Church is partnering with Place for Hope to make available the Living Well with Differences course to all church leaders as part of their continued ministerial development (CMD).



Living Well with Differences is an online course designed for church leaders who would like to better equipped to recognise and respond well to differences, change and conflict in our churches. It provides an introduction to the dynamics of conflict in ourselves and in faith communities and provides tools for positively addressing conflict and helping create a safer environment for all.

What will be involved?

Participants will be required to participate in 4 online sessions on a weekly basis over the course of a month. Each participant will receive a workbook that contains the content covered, as well as reflective tasks that can be completed between sessions. Each participant will receive a certificate on completion of the course.

Who will facilitate the training?

The course will be facilitated by two Place for Hope facilitators experienced in training others in conflict transformation and mediation.

What will the course include?

- 1. Understanding conflict: We will share what we mean by conflict, and how it 'looks' in our churches; we will also begin to explore our different approaches to conflict, and how we respond.
- **2. Conflict transformation skills:** Working with real life scenarios, we will explore how conflict escalates. In doing so, we will consider tools and techniques to 'lower' the level of conflict, enabling us to work constructively with disagreements in different settings.
- **3. Responding to Bullying & Harrassment:** We will explore how we can respond with dignity and respect as our core values to bullying and harassing behaviour in our church communities.
- **4. SEC Context:** We will look at the internal policies and mechanisms in the Scottish Episcopal Church for handling conflict-related complaints.
- **5. Additional Resources:** Further links and a reading list will be provided For further exploration of the topics covered in the course.

Net Zero Action Plan Consultation Launch Event

11.30am-12.30pm, Wed 15 February 2023

On Wednesday 15 February, Bishop Ian Paton (Convener of the Provincial Environment Group) will launch the consultation phase of the Net Zero Action Plan (2023-2030) which responds to the call for 'urgent action in relation to the global climate emergency'.

This ambitious plan provides the commitment, stability of purpose, necessary financial investment, and corresponding resources at provincial level to give confidence, support and


